Bonfires and fireworks: Advice for Residents in the borough of Croydon f rom London Fire Brigade.

During the autumn months the London Fire Brigade receives a number of calls to firework related incidents.

Did you know it is illegal to set off fireworks between 11pm and 7am? On 5 November, displays can continue until midnight and on certain occasions, such as New Year's Eve, Diwali and Chinese New Year, fireworks can be set off until 1am.

Protect yourself and your community and always follow the firework safety code:

- Only buy fireworks marked with the British Standard Kitemark BS7114
- Don't drink alcohol if setting off fireworks
- Keep fireworks in a closed box and always follow the instructions carefully when using them
- Light them at arms length using a taper and stand well back
- Never go back to them once they are lit. Even if a firework hasn't gone off, it could still explode
- Never throw fireworks and never put them in your pocket
- Respect your neighbours don't let off fireworks late at night and remember there are laws to follow
- Take care with sparklers never give them to children under five. Even when they have gone out they are still hot so put sparklers in a bucket of water after use
- Keep your pets indoors throughout the evening

Bonfire safety

- Build your bonfire well clear of buildings, garden sheds, fences and hedges
- Never use flammable liquids to start a bonfire and never burn dangerous items such as aerosol cans, paint tins, foam furniture or batteries
- Don't leave bonfires unattended. An adult should supervise it until it has burnt out. If it has to be left, damp it down with plenty of water

- Always keep a bucket of water or a hosepipe nearby in case of fire
- If there is a fire, stay calm, raise the alarm and move as quickly as possible. Don't try to pick up valuables or possessions
- Call the fire brigade on 999 and clearly state the address of the fire.

Trading Standards Update Trish Burls - Principal Officer, Trading Standards

Two of the latest fraud alerts from Croydon Trading Standards.

We thought it might be useful for you to read about a couple of the latest rogue trading threats - forewarned is forearmed!

The problem: The Energy Saving Scam: the end of the green deal has co-incided with a rise in the number of referrals regarding energy related scams, many of which relate to cold/nuisance telephone calls. Callers often offer an energy saving device, which will allegedly lead to huge savings in energy bills. This results in a resident revealing their bank details over the phone and receiving a plug in electronic device which in some circumstances has proven to be unsafe. The advice: If a device has been received consumers should not use it as it poses a potential fire risk. Consumers should never give out any personal financial information over the telephone to unknown callers.

The problem: Criminals selling items on social media: We've seen a rise in a variety of products being made available through a number of sites – from Facebook to Gumtree. Items include products that turn out to be fake, or even cars where the mileage has been reduced in order to increase value.

The advice: Why would you buy something from an unverified source simply because it may be cheaper than from an established retailer? Carry out exactly the same checks that you would if it was a high street retailer and remember – if it seems too good to be true it probably is!
